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This Month in History Battle of the Northern Beachheads

Australian victories at Milne Bay (25 August – 7 September 1942) and Kokoda (21 July – 16 November 1942) destroyed Japanese plans for capturing Port Moresby but 9,000 Japanese remained entrenched in the eminently defensible northern beachheads of Buna, Gona and Sanananda.

The weary Australian units, who had pushed the Japanese across the Owen Stanley Range, were called upon to attack and capture Sanananda and Gona, even though many units were down to one-third normal strength. Two regiments of the American 32nd Division were given the task of capturing Buna.

The untried American 128th Regiment launched their attack on Buna and nearby Cape Endaiadere on 19 November 1942 but failed against experienced Japanese troops. A day later the Australian 25th Brigade attacked Gona, while the 16th Brigade advanced up the central Sanananda Track. These attacks also faltered.

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Passing of Kokoda Veteran, Cec Driscoll

Sadly since our last newsletter, another Kokoda veteran has passed. VX117315 Cecil Mott Driscoll who served with both B and C Company of the 39 Australian Infantry Battalion, passed away on 15 October 2021. Cec was a great friend to Kokoda Historical and helped us with our 75th reenactment back in 2017. Cec was the second eldest of seven children and was born in Merbein, Victoria in 1920.

Cec passed away on Friday, 15th October 2021, just 2 days after his 101st birthday. He was a loving husband to Heather, dearly loved father of Daryl & Judi; Dennis & Carolyn; Karen; and Maree. He was the adored grandfather of 9, great grandfather of 19, and g.g.grandfather of 2. When Cec was in second grade, his family moved from Merbein to Moonabel, near Avoca, where his father worked as a shearer and beekeeper.

When aged 11 years old, Cec and his family suffered a tragic loss when Cecil Snr passed away suddenly. The death of his father resulted in the family moving back to Merbein, and Cec left school as soon as he turned 14 and worked to support the family. Like many young men at the time, when the Second World War broke out, Cec was eager to enlist. Several of his mates from Merbein had been called up, leaving Cec waiting for word on his own conscription. However because he didn't have a father and was the eldest son he was excluded from the call up. With that, Cec volunteered to serve in the militia, and soon joined the 39th Australian Infantry Battalion which was already in training.

Embarking for service in New Guinea soon after, this boy from the Mallee recalled his journey as the first time he'd seen the ocean, and he didn't like his time at sea. Originally part of the 39th Battalion's C Company, Cec was transferred to B Company just as they were about to make their way across the Kokoda Track – the first group to do so. There was very little military training, they were under-armed, and nothing could have prepared them for the terrible conditions they were

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battle that the 39th was involved in over the following months. Brigade Hill was the only one he missed.

Whilst Cec escaped being seriously wounded while in New Guinea, he wasn't left completely unscathed. Like so many others, he suffered dysentery, tinea, scrub typhus and malaria, and he also casually described his many near misses in conflict! The 39th battalion were taken off the track after being reinforced by the experienced soldiers of the 2/14th & 2/16th battalions of the AIF, and many were so ill they were repatriated back to Sydney by hospital ship. Cec had dropped in weight from 10 stone to 6st 8lb during his time in the jungle and, suffering from malaria, he spent a long period recovering in Concord Hospital where he met his future wife, Heather, who was nursing there. They were married in December 1944 Cec would eventually join the 2/2nd Australian Infantry Battalion in New Guinea and was discharged in January 1946.
