Well the day has finally come! After nearly two years since COVID closed the borders between Australia and PNG, we are finally able to resume travel. As of 16 February 2022, PNG have reinstated tourist visas. The steps we will need to do in order to visit PNG are simple: you will need to be fully vaccinated against COVID-19, have a negative PCR test within 72 hours of travelling and a negative RAT on arrival.

The cover photo this month is of Bomana War Cemetery on Anzac Day, the last time we were able to commemorate this important occasion in PNG was back in 2019. In 2022, it is even more important as we commemorate the 80th Anniversary of Kokoda.

Recently the Kokoda Trek Operators Association (KTOA) of which Kokoda Historical is a founding member held their first meeting for 2022. The news released through the KTOA is exciting as our President has met with both PNG and Australia DFAT representatives, all of whom are working hard to get tourism in PNG back on track. KTOA representatives will fly to Port Moresby and walk Kokoda in the next fortnight, we will be talking to the locals on the ground, ensuring we have COVID safe protocols in place and helping local stakeholders prepare for the return of tourists. on Anzac Day treks and tours and will be holding a Zoom information session as we prepare to return to PNG.

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## THE BLOODY BEACHHEADS ONE DAY CONFERENCE THE BATTLES OF GONA, BUNA AND SANANANDA

The Battle of the Beachheads was the bloodiest of all the Papuan campaigns. The resolve and tenacity of the Japanese defenders was, to Allied perceptions, unprecedented to the point of being "fanatical", and had not previously been encountered. It was to mark the conduct of further battles throughout the remainder of the war. Securing victory at the Battle for the Beachheads cost Australia 1,261 dead and 2,210 wounded, and the Americans 734 dead and 2,037 wounded.

What was the Japanese plan? Who controlled the sea and the sky? How did the Allies mass forces onto the northern coast of Papua? Was the order to destroy the Japanese positions necessary? How well did the Australian and American forces cooperate in fighting the battle? Were Allied forces pushed beyond their capability? How much did tanks help to break the stalemate? What are the legacies of this littleknown chapter of military history?

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## This Month in History-Bombing of Darwin

On 19 February 1942, the Japanese mounted two air raids on Darwin and mainland Australia came under foreign attack for the first time since white settlement.

Admiral Chūichi Nagumo (1887 – 1944), the mastermind of the Pearl Harbor attack on 7 December 1941, planned the Darwin raids, which involved 54 land-based bombers and 188 aircraft launched from four aircraft carriers operating in the Timor Sea. The Japanese, who were preparing to invade Timor, correctly surmised that a disruptive air attack on the Darwin base would hinder any Allied counteroffensive.

The first attack began just before 10.00 am and lasted 40 minutes. Heavy bombers struck harbour installations and the town, while dive bombers, escorted by Zero fighters, attacked shipping in the harbour, the military and civil aerodromes and the hospital at Berrimah. The second raid began an hour later and involved high altitude bombing of the Royal Australian Air Force (RAAF) base at Parap. This raid lasted about 20 minutes.
