The PCR test, prior to departure along with the RAT test on the way in and way out of PNG has also been scrapped. At present a tourist visa needs to be obtained online, prior to arrival. However, the industry body is making representation to the PNG government about allowing visa on arrival to be reinstated. It is likely this will happen very soon which will make it much easier for Australians planning to visit PNG.

Our team the Green Masin in Kokoda and Port Moresby are very happy to welcome tourists back to their beautiful country and look forward to several big treks later in the year. David Howell of Kokoda Historical has been featured in the latest edition of Mufti, the official publication of RSL Victoria.

Returning to the Kokoda Track two years after COVID-19 closed international borders was always going to be an emotional pilgrimage for David Howell, but when he packed his rucksack for Port Moresby in March, he was also carrying very precious cargo.

The former Army Reservist who takes Australians to Kokoda to share the stories of our soldiers and honour their efforts during WWII, was looking forward to reconnecting with the Papua New Guinea locals he has called friends since he began Kokoda historical tours in 2005; but first he had a special task to carry out.

After Kokoda veteran George Cops passed away in 2019, his family asked David if he would fulfil George's wish to have his ashes scattered over the graves of his lost mates. No one could have predicted it would be two long years before David and his colleague Mick O'Malley, a friend to George Cops, were able to honour the family's request.

The little hamlet of Templeton's Crossing has been uninhabited for a while, the village huts are dilapidated, and the once manicured grass clearings have been reclaimed by the jungle.

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
FOOTAGE FROM THE FIRST AUSTRALIAN TREK ACROSS KOKODA SINCE COVID

Our Anzac Kokoda trek was the first commercial company across Kokoda since the COVID pandemic. On the trek there were two brothers, Dan & Matt Nadino (pictured right under the archways at Kokoda. The two fit lads had a great time as they undertook the ultimate Australian pilgrimage in this the 80th anniversary year of the battles fought in Papua.

Kokoda Historical was joined by Australian Kokoda Tours. The two groups came together and spoke to the landowners at Kovello who had blocked the track to bring their plight to the attention of a wider audience. Despite what some media outlets recorded, the blockade was peaceful, it was to do with Ward payments not received from their own elected officials not to do with trekking companies.
